


Why are we doing this?

Why Integrate Reading and Writing?

- They naturally reinforce each other.
 - writing summaries helps with reading summaries
 - reading comparison/contrasts helps with writing comparison/contrasts
 - previewing and peer response
 - what does this paragraph say; what does this paragraph do
- We can solve problems with conflicting terminology.
- IRW shortens the pipeline.


Why did we ever separate reading and writing?

What kinds of obstacles or challenges are involved in integrating reading and writing?

- faculty development
- credential issues
- suspicion/tension/hostility between the two departments
- two departments agreeing on
 - pedagogy
 - texts
 - $_{\circ}$ syllabus
 - hours per week
 - grading/evaluating
 - where the course belongs organizationally
 - scheduling
- reading getting short shrift

One Suggestion for Pedagogy

Reading/Writing Projects

- Readings organized around an issue/topic
- Four to six weeks
- Consisting of something like the following
 - 5 to 7 articles or chapters to read
 - 4 to 6 short papers
 - a half dozen group activities
 - \circ a video or two
 - one 3-to-4 page essay
