### President's Thoughts: Data Collection and Analysis

I am currently getting my doctoral degree from Ferris State University in Higher Educational Leadership. As a part of my program, I am taking a qualitative research class where I am growing in my understanding of what that entails. Taking this course has led me to think about data collection and analysis along with its impact on our work.

I believe data is one of the tools we have to tell our story. By using both qualitative and quantitative data, we can tell a strong and compelling story of our impact on a student's journey. Whether it be their journey through a developmental education program, a First-Year Experience program, or a holistic advising program, we can use data to understand what worked or adjust what didn't. Why is this important? Because in many cases, we are not the decision-makers on what we provide to students.

Legislators and governing bodies are a part of life. As educators in higher education, our work is impacted by those who must make decisions on a large scale. In particular, I am thinking of Arizona and Texas where legislators have introduced and passed legislation impacting how underprepared students are served. Collecting data has never been more important. Why? Because we can use it to determine and define student success, to understand if our programs are working, as well as to create or eliminate programs. More importantly, though, we can use it to support the work we do to those who make decisions on a macro scale. We must know our own data before we can speak with decision makers.

Data, simply put, is another word for information. We need to be armed with information about our programs so that we

- 1. can complete an unbiased evaluation of our programs,
- 2. can develop an understanding of how decisions made by lawmakers might impact our programs,
- are able to share and present on our program successes to decisionmakers, and
- 4. become the experts of our work.

In essence, no one can speak to the success of your program better than you. I urge all of you to collect your data, know your story, and share it; the more vocal we are about our successes, the more we are heard.
